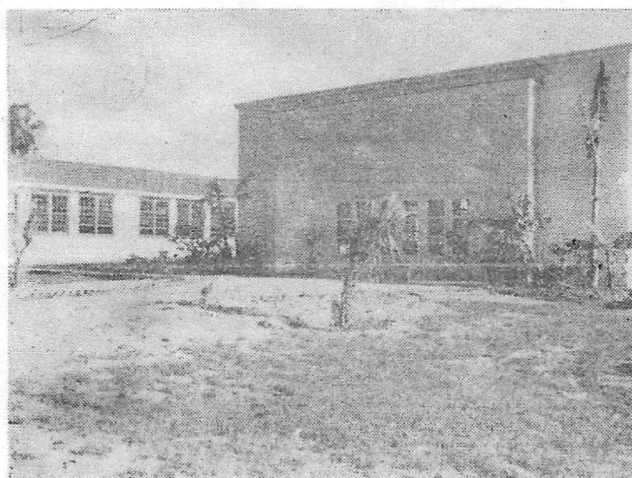

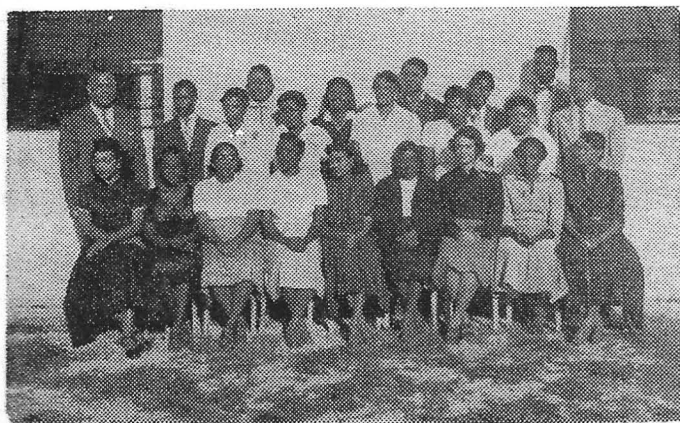

WORDS FROM THE PRINCIPAL

May I take the opportunity to thank Superintendent Long, members of the Clay County School Board, citizens, the most loyal student body and the efficient and cooperative faculty for helping to make this occasion possible and successful. I should like to extend gratitude to all of these individuals who worked in the past and who are presently carrying on. We are honoring many people today. We feel that this has been long overdue. In order to bring us up to date we have endeavored to pay tribute to all of these for some might retire, others might move away, and still others might pass on into the great beyond before an occasion of this kind can be made possible. People like these whom we honor today are the molders of the world who get little credit and seldom are mentioned among the world's achievers. The world usually sees only the successful work. These honored men and women are but rounds in the ladder upon which boys and girls climb to various heights in life. Their names or faces are never or seldom seen in the papers and yet they are in the background helping make it possible for boys and girls, men and women to succeed.

"There is so much good to say,
So much that is still untold,
Let us look to the newer day,
Let us turn from the Evils of Old.
A life that is wide as the sky,
Is surely within our reach;
We can gain it if we try,
Through the children whom we teach!"

Green Cove Springs, Florida

November 14, 1954

Dunbar High School began about sixty years ago, in what was known then as the Masonic Hall located on Palmetto Avenue on the site where the Donaldson's home now stand.

It then had one teacher, Professor Carl Edwards, and a small group of children. The school was ungraded and the term was only four months.

A few years later, a tourist, Mr. Gail Borden, came to this city to live. He gave the Negro citizens of Green Cove Springs a Public School Building on Wallburg and Cypress streets. The school was called Green Cove Springs Colored School. It had, at this time, three teachers, Professor John A. Wright, Mrs. Carrie Wright and Mrs. Emma Bailey. The School term had increased to six months.

The State Legislature finally passed laws providing for school terms to be lengthened to nine months, and the term for Dunbar was lengthened.

The following persons served as principals between 1896 and 1924—John Anderson, James Williams, John Hopps, B. P. Hartwell, O. F. Wiles, N. W. Ross, Edwin Groover, H. C. Williams and E. J. W. Day.

In 1924, one of the schools Elementary graduates was brought back as principal, namely, W. N. Zanders. During this term the school made an attempt to support the Community Welfare with meetings and giving socials, etc. The first P.T.A. was organized during this term. The trustees then were: J. P. Tillinghast, J. C. Willis and J. W. Locket. Trustees recommended teachers to the school board and had supervisory powers over the school. Teachers did much good during these days to better the school and community as a whole. In the meetings held monthly plans were made for raising monies to purchase school supplies and interest the community and school officials in extending the school term.

The first Junior High School graduation was held May 8, 1908 with the following persons graduating: Sarah Collins, Anna Willie, Edwin Carter and William Hall. The principal at that time was the late B. F. Hartwell.

The Dunbar Senior High School had its beginning in 1931 with Professor R. C. Bannerman as Principal who named it "DUNBAR" in honor of Paul Lawrence Dunbar.

The first person to graduate from the—NOW—acquired Senior High School was Mrs. Celia Bannerman, the wife of the principal, in 1934.

In 1944, after the school site had been condemned for several years, principal Bannerman interceded with the Clay County Board of Public Instruction to see what could be done in getting a new school on a new site. He was told that if the Negro Citizens found the site and purchased the land the County and State would give them

the building. Profesor Bannerman and teachers, namely; Bernice Hall Forde, Martha Robinson Jones, Rosa B. Aarons, Theresa Redmond Marie, Virginia Clayton Ray, Susie Small and Mozelle Francis Peters, were sent out to select a site. They selected the present one, which was owned by the renowned sculptress Augustas Savage, who was born and reared on this very site. Miss Savage was happy to sell it for this purpose for \$500.00, which the teachers and citizens raised themselves. Professor Bannerman, having worked hard these many years, became suddenly ill and was unable to complete the task started. He resigned because of illness. After the resignation in 1945, Theresa R. Marie, who was a teacher at this time, became principal in the old school, with the following teachers added to the staff: Eugenia Powell Argrett, Jerusha Major, and Josephine Strong. During this year the building was torn down and the school was held in the Mt. Zion A.M.E. Church and Hall. While having school in these places the Church was destroyed by fire. Because the Hall was not large enough to house the children, classes were moved into the incomplete building that was being erected on Middleburg Avenue, the present site. There were no doors, windows or heat. Classes were held outdoors with fire being built of tire tubes. Through hardship and toils, we endeavored to have school. The principal, Theresa R. Marie, became ill in 1946 and Homer Williams came to this school as principal with no new members coming to the faculty. In 1947, N. W. Campbell came as principal with the new teacher being Pearl Crump. In 1948, James A. Ellerbe, was appointed to serve as principal with F. W. Hinson as new teacher. Mr. Ellerbe served the term and the following term, Mr. Hinson became principal, and remained until 1954, with new teachers being added as follows: 1949-50, Thomas Brown, 1950-51, Morean Thomas, Mildred Bannerman, and Cornelia Hinson, 1951-52, Joseph Johnson. During these years the following buildings were erected; The Industrial Arts, and Cafetorium and the setting up of the first Library unit.

The present school term 1954-55 took on new life by, enriching the curriculum, improving and beautifying the physical plant and surroundings, and increasing the personnel with Maxwell W. Saxon as principal, who came to the position August 17th. Prior to this term, many classes were over crowded, teacher loads were over the minimum, there was no provision for the teaching of Science in the High School. The Home Economic teacher had been attempting to teach science without laboratory equipment or supplies and seats were inadequate for classes. Many students carried seats from room to room as the class period changed. Class room supplies were furnished at a minimum through the efforts of teachers' personal purchases. The newly built Industrial Arts Shop was equipped with some electric machinery but did not have the every day hand tools, hammer, saws, etc.; which boys would need to learn to use. The Typing classes had not been established as such. Students

sat on discarded army mess hall tables and attempted typing as an activity without credit. The Home Economic department did not have cooking stoves, sink, running water, (hot or cold), dishes, kitchen utensils, cabinets, or any of the essentials for teaching, with the exception of a used dilapidated refrigerator, one electric machine and one old treddly top, an electric iron and board. The play and physical education area was hazardous, the light poles and the basketball goals had deteriorated to the extent that some of them had fallen to the ground, no adequate office space for offices for the principal and keeping records was provided.

PROGRESS MADE

Since August 17th, 1954, the Home Economic department has received through the superintendents office more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) in supplies and equipment. A gas kitchen, including a stove, hot water heater, etc., approximately two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) in wiring and installing electric receptacles for sewing machines and other equipment, connecting and installing water (hot and cold), painting and decorating the department, placing of jalousie doors, screen windows, cabinets, shelves, a sufficient number of chairs and tables. The citizens and organizations of the community have purchased an electric kitchen, complete with refrigerator, stove, sink, etc., matching the gas kitchen purchased by the school board, two electric sewing machines have been given to the department by friends.

In the Business department, modern typing tables and chairs have been purchased by the school board to replace the old mess hall tables. Typewriters have been added, all typewriters repaired, covers, etc., have been provided for and the department has been moved to a more desirable location.

For the Industrial Arts department, approximately two hundred dollars (\$200.00) worth of hand tools have been purchased, so that students might learn to repair steps, screens and replace board in the floor, etc. Prior to this term the Industrial Arts shop had been provided but no instructor had been employed. Mechanical Drawing, Woodwork, minor repairs are among the things now being taught.

Instructional and class room supplies for elementary and high school have been provided this year for the first time by the superintendent's office and all needed books (new) have been furnished. Sufficient desks, chairs, have been provided for.

The principal's offices have been extended to provide ample space and facilities for conference, records, etc.

In the Department of Health and Physical Education, a new cement basketball court with steel goal posts has been erected at a value of approximately one thousand eight hundred dollars (\$1,800.00). Three volley ball courts, a second basket

ball court for practicing (clay) has been added to the play area.

Much time and money has been spent in the purchasing and planting of flowers and shrubbery to improve the general school site.

Proper lighting has been installed or completed and window shades to most of the class rooms. New sidewalks have been erected, poles for wiring and reflectors for the lighting of basketball court, new flags, folding chairs for the band, and many other needed items have been furnished.

In the area of transportation, the old dilapidated bus has been replaced with a new 1954, sixty passenger, "BIG BOY," Ford bus.

In the curriculum, the Home Economic program has extended its offerings to include, Food and Nutrition, Clothing, Child Development, Home Living 7th grade, Home Making 8th grade, Home Making Education I 9th grade, Home Making Education II 10th grade, Home Making Education III, 11th and 12th grades, which includes Personal Growth and Family Relationship, Manners for Teens and Housing, and a New Home Makers of America Chapter has been organized.

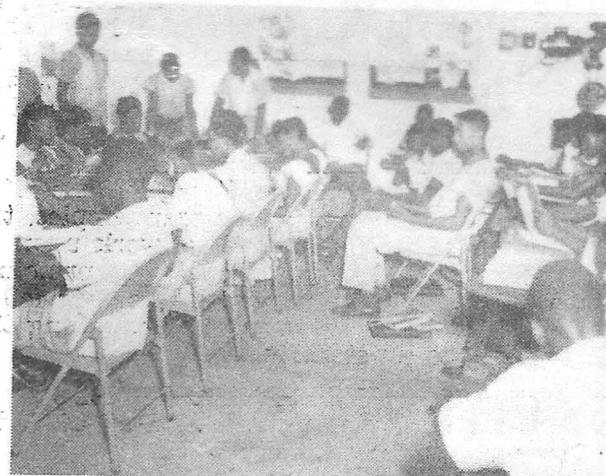
Social Science and Communications, which includes the Language, Arts, Speech, etc., are now being taught in the 7th and 8th grades, as a core unit. In the High School, all teachers plan basically together, then in department areas and finally individual planning.

In the Elementary Department, the lower elementary grades 1-2-3, plan and work as a unit, while the upper elementary grades, 4, 5, 6, work and plan together.

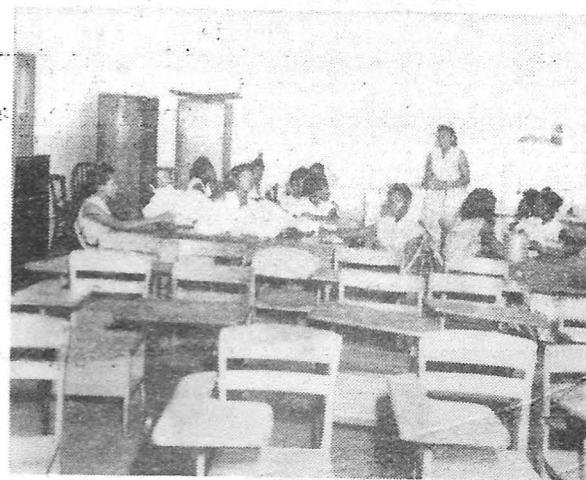
Other subjects are offered in the Business or Commercial Department, such as Business Mathematics, Letter Writing, although they may or may not be taught by the Business teacher.

In the area of Science, Physical Science, General Science and Chemistry have been added to the curriculum. Public School Music is offered in all grades as enrichment. Health and Physical Education is extended through the high school.

AS I RECALL

The School cafeteria had its beginning in the first grade classroom in 1941, while the school was still housed in the old building. A separate kitchen was built with the personnel being hired by the School Board. In 1942 Mrs. Charlotte Major was in charge of the lunch room and Mrs. Elizabeth Jackson was in charge the following year. During these two years the children brought their plates and silver from home to be served in their respective classrooms.

When we moved to the present site in 1947, we had no cafeteria or lunch room program. When Mr. James Ellerbe came to us as Principal, he contacted Miss Julia Smith, lunchroom Supervisor, to re-open the program. Miss Smith very graciously consented and began assisting the Principal in setting up the lunch room in the present Home Economic Room. She employed two workers, namely: Mrs. Ellen Robinson and Mrs. Maxine Gibson. The Home Economics Room was used as a dining room and kitchen for four years.

1953 brought new hopes and new visions with the present building being erected and equipped with all modern conveniences. It is a "DREAM COME TRUE."

The Lunch Room Program is a part of the School Educational Program in our school. At the present time it is well staffed to serve the needs of the students and teachers at Dunbar High School.

A PARENT'S PRAYER
